Or should a settler that cannot afford to build a fence around his whole place be forced to go into debt that he may do so to keep out the other fellow's cattle? Let us think this over, if we have not done so in the past. 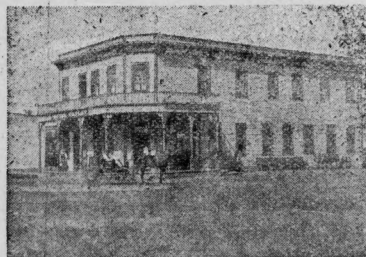
